A growing talent hub

Tauranga is New Zealand's fastest growing city. To keep pace and grow our local economy, we need to create a prosperous and sustainable region benefiting all of our people, one that contributes to improved social, cultural and environmental outcomes.

Tauranga Moana needs an economy underpinned by skilled talent, innovation and collaboration. For sustainable economic growth, economic strategy should inform local planning and spatial development.

Our city, people and employers will flourish when we:

- Grow local talent by bridging the gap between education and employment
- Support talent **retention** by encouraging businesses to prepare for the Future of Work
- Upskill existing staff and **provide opportunities** for those new to the workforce
- Undertake targeted skills **attraction** to support business sustainability.

Priority One has developed the Tauranga Moana Talent Action Plan to showcase the work already being done in the region connecting youth and business, supporting pathways for rangatahi Māori, and preparing the current workforce and local employers for the Future of Work.

The Action Plan captures and presents the work happening in our region across the talent space. Workstreams that support local businesses to retain and attract the people they need, ensuring job seekers are supported in their training and career pathways and creating opportunities for rangatahi to develop work-ready skills.

We unashamedly have lofty goals, aiming to create a positive, inclusive, empowering employment culture in Tauranga Moana. We want to raise annual income levels within the sub-region to national parity by 2035 (2045 for Māori) and be a sustainable high-income earning region after that.

Tauranga Moana is a growing talent hub with exciting opportunities and diverse sector needs surrounding the Future of Work in our region. Together, we can build on this momentum, ensuring a sustainably prosperous region for generations to come.

Youth and business - Better together



Tauranga Moana has a growing youth population, especially rangatahi Māori. It's these young people who hold the key to our region's success – they're the solution for our businesses' ongoing labour challenges.

It's natural then that our rangatahi, businesses and communities are at the centre of our Action Plan. Our focus is on connecting and empowering youth and businesses within Tauranga Moana.

Engaging with rangatahi early, developing the skills they will need to succeed, and showcasing the opportunities available in Tauranga, are key to business prosperity.

Priority One delivers a range of projects and initiatives to empower youth and connect businesses with talent to ensure a sustainable and prosperous economy that works better together.

Priority One's **Instep Programme** bridges the gap between education and employment. It inspires our young people by showcasing local career and training opportunities – preparing them to thrive in a world of change. Rangatahi are introduced to Priority One's business network, giving them valuable insights into the Future of Work in Tauranga Moana.

The **Instep Young Leaders' Forum** provides secondary students a voice on important local issues, develops their **leadership** skills, and builds future networks across businesses in the Western Bay of Plenty.

The Instep Programme creates opportunities to inform, encourages **collaboration**, and informs and inspires our school communities about our local businesses and their skill needs.

The **Canvas Careers Expo**, delivered by Priority One in partnership with the Rotary Club of Tauranga, is attended by over 5000 people annually. The event brings together local businesses, tertiary and training providers, and community organisations, showcasing diverse career pathways to rangatahi, teachers, and parents.

Working closely with Toi Kai Rawa, the Bay of Plenty's Māori economic development organisation, we support culturally responsive engagement to help lift the skills, employability, and future incomes of **rangatahi Māori**.

With a growing innovation and start-up sector in Tauranga, the **Young Innovator Awards (yia!)** help create tomorrow's innovators, today. Students are challenged to develop and apply key skills such as critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, and communication. yia! is creating a highly skilled talent pipeline for our growing tech, innovation, and start-up sector.

Priority One's **vocational experiences and career days** connect youth directly to business people throughout the region. They allow students to engage directly and learn from local businesses and industry sectors.

The Acorn Foundation / Dale Carnegie scholarship programme is an intensive three-day workshop supporting local secondary school students to develop 'skills for success'. This unique opportunity is made possible through the generosity of Acorn Foundation donor, Mary McGowan.

Preparing Tauranga Moana for the Future of Work

The most important contribution Priority One can make to regional prosperity is to ensure local people, businesses, and the region are well prepared to transition successfully into a Future of Work in a time when skilled talent is hard to find and retain.

The world is changing rapidly, and with it, the talent needed within businesses. Being well prepared for the Future of Work is critical for business sustainability. We need a collaborative, regional approach to ensure the Western Bay of Plenty grows, retains, and attracts the talent it needs.

Sector Talent Plans to support industry needs

We're currently working with local businesses to create and deliver Sector Talent Plans (STPs) to address the needs of specific industries. We believe a collaborative, deliberate and strategic industryled approach is needed to address current and future talent needs. STPs deliver an agreed set of activations supporting key industries to meet their longer-term skill needs.

Priority One has delivered the region's first STP in partnership with the Professional Services and Technology industries. We'll now work to deliver STPs to other growth sectors with high needs and urgent talent requirements.

Engagement, collaboration, and education

Our Action Plan is underpinned by engagement and education opportunities to connect, inform, and upskill local businesses on talent-related matters.

Examples include the Future of Work Leadership Series, Immigration Seminars, University of Waikato R&D Lab, Economic Updates, and Regional Skills Planning Workshops.

Priority One has also created a number of free resources, which are available on the Priority One website, to support the Future of Work.

Pathways to work

Ara Rau is Priority One's skills and employment hub supporting pathways to work. Ara Rau helps to develop and enable local people to meet future labour market shortages and supports our region's labour market needs through connecting job seekers, employers, and training providers.

Ara Rau's focus is to support those Not in Education or Employment (NEETs) by creating customised pathways into work and helping local employers to develop relationships for long-term success. In doing so, Ara Rau opens new pathways supporting local people into quality jobs.

Putting Tauranga Moana on the map

Tauranga Moana continues to experience significant population and job growth, particularly in sectors like professional services, technology, construction and trades, healthcare, education, and horticulture.

The region doesn't have all the talent we need to fuel these sectors. Getting Tauranga Moana into the hearts and minds of people outside our region will be essential in ensuring we attract a sustainable talent pipeline so our city and businesses can prosper.

We have a number of projects underway to attract highly-skilled talent to the region, grow the city as a tertiary destination, and upskill and support those that already live here to empower their career journeys.

Tauranga, a tertiary study destination of choice

A 2021 national student insights study shows Tauranga ranks highly as a work destination for young people. With a significant and growing local tertiary education presence with the University of Waikato and Toi Ohomai | Te Pūkenga, Tauranga has a fantastic opportunity to connect study pathways to local jobs.

Together with Tauranga City Council and the University of Waikato, we're delivering an ambitious work programme to grow Tauranga as a tertiary study destination of choice. The programme aims to support the University of Waikato's intended growth to 5000 students over the next few years.

Priority One works closely with employers to ensure they both contribute to, and benefit from, growing the region as a tertiary destination. Four initiatives, including Summer Open Labs, Enrolment to Employment Pathways Programme, Regional Graduate Programme and the Research and Innovation Centre, have been designed to support employer engagement with tertiary students, ensuring local businesses have early access to homegrown talent.

Work life balance in Tauranga Moana

Work Life Tauranga (previously known as Wish You Were Working Here), is Tauranga's **online talent hub**, attracting domestic and international talent into our city.

A resource for those looking to **explore** Tauranga Moana as a potential working destination, the platform showcases our region as a desirable place to work and live through telling stories of local companies, people, and industry sectors, from a people and purpose perspective.

Work Life Tauranga also provides a range of tools and useful resources to support Tauranga employers with their retention and talent attraction needs.

Talent attraction with specific needs

Priority One supports the needs of local employers through targeted attraction of skilled and investor migrants. We deliver marketing campaigns and offshore attraction events that support local businesses to attract the specific talent and skills they need while showcasing Tauranga Moana as an outstanding destination to live and work.


Attracting international students

International students support global citizenship, diversity, and inclusion within Tauranga Moana. They also contribute to the region's export earnings.


